MEMBER COMMENTS

From the Desk of Your Editor:

We're heading into the traditional vacation season and I hope you are all planning a get away—whether it's for a few days or much longer! We went to New Orleans for a week in March to celebrate our daughter's birthday. What an incredible place—it's a city long in history and an explosion of sights, sounds, tastes, peoples, aromas, music, odors, pleasures, colors, mysteries, alligators, foods, seasonings, palm readings, voodoo, drinks, creoles, beads, mardi gras, muffulettas, chicory coffees, Cajuns, café au laits, beignets, languages, carriage rides, plantations, religions, ghosts, cemeteries, bayous, trinkets, streetcars, legends, and so much more! Some of the smells of the French Quarter did make me glad I live in Poulsbo! We learned how to traverse the trolley along St. Charles Avenue during our week there and, no matter where we went, Mardi Gras madness was everywhere—in the stores, along the streets, in the statues by the river, hanging from trees, embellishing galleries and balconies—a profusion of beads and masks even though Fat Tuesday had been gone over a month! The weather was cold when we visited Audubon Park but it was fun looking at the nesting egrets and the dozing turtles along the water's edge, and then, on our long walk back along Magazine Street, we found a really old neighborhood tavern called Henry's Uptown Bar where we bought drinks and had our first experience of walking down the street with an alcoholic beverage in our hands! Music was everywhere from jazz to rock to the "down home" music you would have heard while watching "O Brother, Where Art Thou". We had our first taste of alligator and surprise, surprise, everyone really liked it so much that we'd get two or three orders of alligator bites whenever they were available! Wandering through the French Quarter for the first time was another unique experience—what with the mimes sprayed gold or silver or dressed as pirates or ladies of the night, doorways where you just stepped up and ordered a Hurricane or a Hand Grenade or some other libation, the "Hustler" signs, the nude pictures, the easy women standing in doorways, all the bars with interesting come-ons, an ongoing barrage of a wild and decadent society!!! We took a carriage ride with "Bob" and "Sandy" through parts of the French Quarter and past Lafitte's Blacksmith Shop Bar, the oldest working bar in the US. Bob told us many great stories and pointed out the homes of Angelina and Brad Pitt, Nicolas Cage and a few others while Sandy, the mule, kept us from getting hit by cars. We went on a Honey Island Swamp Tour and along the way to the swamp we saw some of the devastation Hurricane Katrina left in her path—big empty parking lots with grass growing through the cracks where obviously there had been complexes and apartment buildings, etc. But we also saw some reclamation with new apartments, housing developments, and such. Capt. Jack gave us a terrific swamp tour but sadly we didn't get to see El Whoppo—the really big alligator. Apparently alligators hibernate in the winter and are just coming around this time of the year. We did see a baby alligator and we each got to hold it and have pictures taken. We also visited the Audubon Zoo on a hot and humid day and wandered through Lafayette Cemetery No. 1. We took our last trip on the green trolley to Canal Street where we visited Jackson Square again and had a late lunch at the French Quarter Restaurant where boiled crayfish was ordered by those who still had not had enough spicy creole-type food. We also had our last alligator bites and some crayfish bites. Our last meal in New Orleans was at the Melting Pot which is an experience in itself! (There's a Melting Pot in Seattle for those adventurous souls out there.) If you're wondering where to go, think about a trip to New Orleans—a really terrific place to visit but I wouldn't want to live there!

Who's in Control?

As we say goodbye to another April 15th, we have either given more or received back some of our tax money. We hope by contributing to our IRA or 401K that we have reduced our tax bill. In fact we have done just the opposite. We have delayed the tax and turned over our funds to the Federal Government. The government now tells you when you can take out your money, how much you have to take out, and what tax you will pay on your money. Question to ask yourself is; "Do you believe taxes will be higher or lower when you take a distribution from your account?" The earliest you can take out your funds without a penalty is age 59 1/2 and the latest is age 70 1/2. We all know the penalty for early withdrawal is 10%, but do you know what the penalty is after age 70 1/2. Try 50% of the RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) plus the tax on the RMD! The rules for 401Ks are just a little different but what most folks do when they retire or leave a job is to roll their 401K into an IRA. You may control which accounts to allocate your funds but from there, the Government controls the rest. From my experience the market is cyclical. It is nice to retire when the market is going up but what happens to your retirement when the market starts down. Once the funds are in your IRA or brokerage account, what guarantees do you have that the principal will grow let alone be preserved? This is where it is best to have, besides your IRA or 401K, other sources of funds that are guaranteed to grow. Two come to mind. One is permanent dividend paying life insurance and the other is tax deferred annuities. The money in these instruments grow tax deferred and under current tax laws the cash value in your life insurance policy can be used to provide tax free income for retirement. Most of us want to retire, but the one thing we want most is to run out of LIFE before we run out of MONEY.

The Poulsbo Lodge received a check from National for the amount of \$332.64. This is their way of thanking the members for continuing to use Sons of Norway financial instruments. Next month I will provide information on the NEW Whole Life Insurance Policy that is being provided to all of us. Another official flag day in Norway is Constitution Day, the most significant holiday in that country. The constitution was written in six weeks and was signed by delegates May 17, 1814 at Eidsvoll. Nowadays, on May 17th (Syttende Mai) every community in Norway has a parade where all children have the opportunity to participate and sing. They carry flags and march to patriotic music.
