


TROLLS' DEN HOUSE RULES APPENDIX P POULSBO SONS OF NORWAY POLICIES & PROCEDURES

- 1. Core operating hours shall comply with Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board and City Ordinances.
- 2. Minors: No one under the age of 21 shall be permitted in the Trolls' Den.
- 3. Members who are delinquent in their dues shall not enjoy the facilities of the Trolls' Den.
- 4. All visitors must sign the register upon entering the Trolls' Den or other rooms where liquor is being served and the building is closed to the public.
- Visitors must be signed in to the Guest Register by a member of the Lodge and they must leave the Trolls' Den when the member departs.
- 6. The bartenders are responsible for control of all areas where liquor is being served.
- Trolls' Den employees must treat all patrons with respect. Profanity or boisterous conduct on their part anywhere within the Lodge or Trolls' Den will result in disciplinary action.
- 8. Members and visitors must conduct themselves respectfully.

MEMBERS

ONLY

Profanity, boisterous conduct or other unacceptable behavior will not be allowed and infractions may result in being asked to leave the premises of the Trolls' Den.



- Alcohol purchased for on premise consumption must be consumed within designated space. Alcohol purchased for off premise purpose must be consumed off premises.
- 11. A complete roster of all Lodge officers must be posted within the confines of the licensed premises. A copy of the membership roster must be available to the duty bartender.
- 12. If problems do arise in the Trolls' Den that cannot be resolved by the bartender, call 911 first for assistance and then notify the Bar Manager and the Lodge President.
- Bartenders must practice bar control, ensuring that patrons are not over poured or overserved. It is also the responsibility of the bartenders to refuse service if a patron appears intoxicated.
- No alcoholic beverages other than that purchased by the Trolls' Den management will be permitted on the premises.
- Cell phones will not be utilized to order drinks from the Deck or any other location.
- 16. Any time the Trolls' Den is open, the ramp gate to the Deck must be locked so that access to the Deck or Trolls' Den is prohibited; except at such time as the lower level is being utilized as additional outside bar space.
- 17. No pets are allowed in the Trolls' Den or on the Deck or tied up or unattended anywhere on the premises.
- 18. When meals are sold in the Trolls' Den, no other food shall be brought into the Trolls' Den. The only exception allowed would be desserts that can be shared by all those present.

Approved by Lodge House Committee on 7 August 2007, item #15 updated, item #17 changed, item #20 added June 2010; Item #21 added August 2013; Items #1, 2, 9, 11, 14, 19, and 20 revised, Items #4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 13, 15, 18, and 21 unchanged but renumbered, and Items #3, 16, and 17 deleted on October 13, 2020.

The Building Association Auction will be held on Saturday, February 3 at 5:00pm in the Marine Room.




